

Koi Show 2016-Dr. Bob Adler: Bob has scheduled the next Koi Show meeting for Wednesday, December 16th at 7pm at his Hillcrest dental office at 920 Washington St., San Diego, CA. Koi Club of San Diego Ponder Profile Lenore Wade

El Cajon, California

Lenore Wade is a fairly new member to the Koi Club of San Diego but not at all new to the hobby. As long as Lenore can remember she has always raised fish and with the help of her family she is now enjoying a dream come true. Of course with every dream there is usually an interesting story.

Lenore has been a resident of San Diego for over 50 years and recently retired as a school teacher (but not just your average teacher). Always seeking adventure, Lenore moved to Russia for 13 years where she taught English to dozens of students with whom she

While volunteering at Balboa Naval Hospital, Lenore met her late husband who had shared with her his love of Koi that he had come to admire while serving in the Navy stationed in Japan. From that point Lenore always wanted a koi pond and was further encouraged by her brother who also raises koi in Northern California. Now that she is no longer teaching she decided to stay home for a while, renovate her backyard into a playground for her grandkids and of course build that koi pond.

When she mentioned her idea to her local family, her two sons- in- law stepped up and with the help of long time club member Dean Strasser, designed and built a beautiful 2500 gallon concrete pond complete with a beautiful waterfall and sitting bench. The pond water is crystal clear thanks to an 80 watt Emperor UV and 6,000 gallon Ultima II filter. All waste water is recycled and her large yard full of beautiful plants really appreciate that!

With every new pond there are always challenges, what some refer to as the "new pond syndrome" and this pond was no exception. One thing that was learned was that wintertime is probably not the best time to start a pond system as the bio-filter, which is the most important element of the system, takes a little longer to develop when the water is cold. Nitrifying bacteria that removes the ammonia is virtually asleep. It was slow going at first and a few fish were lost but Lenore didn't give up. By that summer, with the help of San Diego Pond and Garden and Jerry Myers' Vagabond Koi Rescue Program, her new pond was a thriving home for 15 koi including two Chinese Hi Fin Sharks. Of course her grandkids have since named all of the fish and Lenore swears that each koi has a different personality. All told her koi are healthy and happy and enjoy munching on their winter diet of Manda Fu, wheat germ and lots of love!

Recently Lenore showed her appreciation to Vagabond Koi by donating the proceeds of some of her beautiful hand stitched pillows, purse and quilt held as a drawing in December. Thanks Lenore so much for sharing your pond and your story with us and for supporting the Koi Club of San Diego!

Quarantine/Isolation/Hospital/Holding Tanks

Hope everyone's holidays were the best and you're ready for a great year to enjoy your koi and pond to the maximum during 2016!! Several club members purchased new koi, including myself, on the club's great bus trip in November (special thanks to trip organizers Susi and Shirley) and during the trip I was asked several questions about quarantine, which led to this article after I made some dumb _ _ _ mistakes setting up my own

quarantine/isolation/holding tank over the past 5 weeks. Ya, I tried a new way, for me, to reduce the bio filtration set up time and used a two-year old test kit for NO2 when checking basic water parameters prior to adding koi – **REAL DUMB ON MY PART!!**

So from the top. All of us should have a plan of what we will do prior to introducing new koi to our ponds. I treat it as a risk assessment evaluation and what I'll do or not do to mitigate that risk before you or I add new koi to our ponds.

So what is the range of possibilities to choose from?

Highest Risk – Buy koi from anywhere or anyone at any time of the year and just add them to your pond.

All points in-between

Lowest Risk - Full quarantine with multiple treatments for just about everything known to cause disease or illness in koi.

Now before you laugh – most of us are backyard koi hobbyists and the investment to provide the lowest level of risk is a decision we choose not to make, but there are a number of hobbyists whose dollar value of their koi collection makes low risk an attractive consideration or necessity and finally do any of us want to lose part or all of our koi collection to illness and disease introduced by a new arrival regardless of monetary value?

Things to consider when making quarantine decisions

Who do you feel confident about buying koi from and why?? You want to know everything about your new koi before purchase – really!!

Dealer—Breeder history/bloodline/age/sex/anything about its expected future/has it only been with its fellow offspring since birth or exposed to other koi/what test and treatments have been conducted/how long has the dealer had the koi and what water parameters is it currently residing in?? What's your history with this dealer? Just to get you thinking.

Do you have - are you ready - do you want to quarantine and what do you want to consider doing???? When considering quarantine, I always recommend a container of at least 100 gallons and 500 gallons is not out of the question. I've had success with a 350 gallon tank of which 50 gallons is the filter (pre and bio). And yes it's 3 feet deep. I can't stress enough that the unit should be fully functional when you add koi!! A lot less problems for you and the koi (especially if sick koi). For me, I have the bio material inside my main pond's bio-chamber and only have to move it to the isolation tank and turn on the pump/extra air/UV/heater and salt if needed and I'm in business after adding a net to cover the unit (jumpers common). Yes, my pond parameters and possible critters come with the bio-material. A risk I'm willing to take!! When a "Q" tank is used often you can put a couple koi in the unit and run it full time. When a "Q" tank is seldom used and advanced seeding in your bio is not wanted or not practical then you can just start from scratch with an understanding of the ramifications (water testing/water changes etc.) and time required to bring the filter to fully functional. Lastly, if you make your koi purchases at or around the same time of the year as most of us do you can prepare your "Q" unit a few weeks prior to the buying season, which is what I did this year (be it poorly). Of course the highest risk goes to just adding a new koi to your pond – enough said. So that leaves us with what are you going to do to your new koi? Think shotgun and make individual risk assessment decisions.

<u>Air:</u> Extra air always a good idea especially with sick koi. I have an 18 inch water fall weir with an 8 inch fall and an 8oL air pump with 10 air stones (8 in the bio and 2 in with the koi) and yes I'm at saturation with a current fish load of five. Don't need a lot of air turbulence in small main tank for koi to deal with.

<u>Heater</u>: You want a sick koi to heal in the shortest time then it's got to be at 74 to 76 degrees!!!!!!!! For new koi purchased in the fall heat will be needed if you plan to test for the virus KHV. I have two 800 watt heaters – one in the prefilter and one in the main unit with koi, and the temp is at 76.1F. Special Note: My fall "Q" is also a grow out tank for new tosai the first year of life NO WINTER – get you about two or even three extra inches of growth (or so they say).

<u>Light</u>: If you "Q" your koi_in the garage or other out building you will need to provide some additional artificial light during normal day light hours.

Koi Health cont...

- <u>Common Parasites</u>: Dr. Johnson D.V.M. and others still hold that salt will eliminate several common parasites and the levels used in Japan have been increasing over the past few years. Point three percent is still listed as therapeutic, but I've experienced koi professionals using higher percentages (.4 to .6 for a short duration) when dealing with common parasites. Should this fail there are additional treatment regimens for the more common parasites. Salt is very helpful when dealing with sick koi.
- Others: Flukes (skin and gill parasites); Argulus (lice), Lernea (anchor worm) and Ergasilus (gill maggots); Fungus; Intestinal worms; and Bacterial infections to include the gills all have separate treatments should you decide for full shotgun effect to achieve the lowest possible risk factor when adding koi to your pond.
- I trust now you have a better idea of why I ask so many questions when purchasing a new koi. When my new koi purchase has been treated with a high salt treatment in Japan and scraped for parasites by my dealer and treated with salt, Chloramine T and fluke treatments plus my own scrapes and gill snips taken after I get home are parasite free I only treat for what I find which is usually, BUT not always, nothing. When the group of koi I pick from has been tested for KHV, I keep the heaters on and expose the koi for at least 21 days and look for signs of the disease. I've only seen three cases (two by necropsy) of intestinal worms over the last 11 years as a KHA so I accept the risk and do not treat for them in my new koi purchases, but this treatment is suggested by our local Dr. Todd Cecil D.V.M. as part of his list to obtaining the lowest possible risk prior to introducing a new koi to your pond.
- So the above is intended to get you thinking about reviewing how and what you might consider before adding your next new koi to your pond.
- In general for us in southern California when buying new koi October to March we purchase a koi that has been stressed and transported several times when we get it home. Stress is a well-known factor in reducing the immune response in koi and it's already reduced due to lower water temps during the winter months. Put simply you want to eliminate anything the new koi might bring with them to keep your established pond disease free. Towards the middle of "Q" I would add a pond koi to help the new koi adapt (develop immunity) to small doses of anything in your pond that could make your new koi sick. I like adding small amounts of pond water as part of water changes along with the pond koi and see if either develops problems, while they're each working on their individual immune responses as needed.
- I'll close with my error in practicing what I preach. I got started setting up my "Q" tank a couple weeks late and added some new open cell foam to the bio-chamber at the same time I transferred my box of spring flow material from the main pond's bio-chamber. To help achieve a fully functioning bio before adding koi to "Q" tank, I seeded (added) Dr. Tim's Ammonium Chloride Solution for Fishless Cycling daily for about 14 days keeping the NH3 level at about .5 ppm and had the heaters set for 75 degrees. Six days before adding koi to "Q" tank, I stopped adding ammonium to tank and it returned to Zero in three days. I also lowered the temp to receive koi. No water changes were done as I was seeding the system to shorten "Q" cycling. I was so locked on the NH3 being zero and my TWO YEAR OLD Nitrite test kit reading was always ZERO that I added koi to the "Q" tank. The following day, I got a new NO2 test kit and did a full range of tests on the water quality SOMETHING I KNEW I SHOULD HAVE DONE BEFORE I ADDED THE KOI to the "Q". Results NH₃ = 0.0 NO₂ = 5+ NO₃= 100 and rest of the tests were all okay. So I salted the system after doing a 66% water change (6 degree change in temp) and repeated this procedure three more times over the next two days, before I got the water parameters where they belonged. Not sure where my brain was – I think it was out to lunch BIG TIME JUST CRAZY!! To make matters worse after this was over and I reengaged my brain I could have shortened this very stressful time on my koi by moving them to heated main pond water in my transfer tank with O2 and done a single 100% water change in "Q" tank refilled and heated back to 75 degrees and just returned the koi to the "Q" tank and this could have been done the same day I discovered my stupid error. Did not really want to share this story but came at the right time and just reinforces the need to follow the most basic tenants to water quality. It's not rocket science.
- So I hope I've given you some information to consider what you may want to do or not do before adding your next koi to your pond. As always there is a host of information on this subject in koi books and on the web and I encourage you to learn more as I could not fully begin to cover this important subject.

Editors note: While not actually connected to QT of your koi it is something one needs to be aware of, stray electrical current from faulty equipment. I have been helping a club member with the rebuild of their pond. This pond has had issues for years and the owner decided to shut it down and rebuild it. While removing large rocks from the water fall area on one side of the pond I found 4 sets of pond lights, or more exactly the wires for the lights that were buried under the rocks and below water level. There is much to be said about stray current and the effect it has on fish, not to mention that tingly feeling you get when you climb into a pond with this issue.

If you would like to see what the fish must feel take a low volt wires and put a lead on each side of your tongue and hold it there for 4-5 hours every day of the year and let me know if there are any side effects. (DO NOT DO THIS)

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


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


