# Sonoma Fire Koi Rescue Project Update - December 2017

Santa Clara Valley Koi and Water Garden Club was called to assist FEMA / ASPCA with aiding in the rescue of displaced Koi due to the Sonoma / Santa Rosa Fires October 23rd. Mel and Eve Bretzke represented our club and worked with the disaster response authorities over the past two months. Over 160 Koi were rescued from the wildfire burn zone, the most injured survivors were cared for at UC Davis.



Our club members donated time and resources to assist in the rescue efforts. We provided temporary holding tanks, equipment, supplies, and expertise to help rescue, house, and care for many displaced Koi. The project closed December 4<sup>th</sup> at the Sonoma Animal Shelter site along with other aspects of the disaster response efforts. We are in the process of returning all loaned items to members.

The Koi fire survivors were temporarily housed and cared for at the Sonoma County Animal Shelter. Many were returned to their owners, others have been adopted. All have been rescued and re-homed. Many of the rescued Koi were adopted because the home owner's ponds were damaged or destroyed in the wildfires.

# Did you know?

Butterfly Koi originated from cross-breeding fish as the result of Japanese breeders interbreeding wild Indonesian longfin river carp with their traditional koi to increase hardiness.

Longfin (butterfly) Koi have longer fins, longer barbels and pompom nostrils, and are thought to be more hardy than regular koi.

Longfin koi are also called Dragon Koi, or Hirenaga(goi).

Well and tap water contain little or no oxygen. Aeration is recommended when adding from these sources. Tap water will also require dechlorination to make it safe for fish and biology of pond.

# Plant of the Month -Water Leather Fern [Acrostichum danaeifolium]



Acrostichum aureum, the golden leather fern, is a large species of fern that grows in mangrove swamps and other wet locations. Other common names include swamp fern and mangrove fern.

The golden leather fern has large fronds growing to a length of six feet. The leaves are glossy, broad and pinnate, the pinnae being dark green, leathery, alternate and widely spaced. The outer fronds arch over sideways but the central ones are nearly straight. Some of the larger fronds bear reproductive organs on the upper five to eight pairs of pinnae. These are brick red and give the pinnae a felted appearance

A true fern, water leather fern is noted for its large fern-shaped leaves that take on shiny, leather texture. It makes a bold statement in larger ponds as is a wonderful accent plant. The leaves appear almost plastic

and assume a cinnamon shade due to the great number of spores they produce on the backs of the leaves. A plant native to Florida.

# **Preparing Your Ponds and Water Gardens for Winter**Compiled by Eve Bretzke

#### Feeding Koi:

The pond water temperature is dropping now and our is now reading at 60°F so now is the time to adjust not only the amount of koi food but also the type of koi food. It is recommended to switch to a low protein diet as the water temperature drops. Watch your koi's appetite it will change, cooler water means a lower metabolism for the koi. Feeding a wheat germ diet is highly recommended and you can read the food labels on the packages to ensure the protein is 32% or less, cut back on feeding, also it is recommended to stop feeding after water temperatures drop to 50°F or below. Invest in a pool or pond water thermometer to track the temperature.

#### Tree Debris:

Keeping your pond clear of tree debris should be a priority, as the weather is changing and wind and rain can blow leaves and branches into the pond which can cause damage to a pond liner. If your pond is around any large trees that shed a lot of leaves, it is recommended to cover the pond with netting to catch the leaves and debris. This will also keep your pond clear of leaves falling to the bottom and causing water toxicity. Also take care of plants around the pond, cutting back any dead branches that could fall inside the pond. Leaves-will change the chemistry of your water. They not only add tannins to the water, discoloring your pretty pond, they lower pH to perhaps dangerous levels. Monitor pond parameters and do water testing during winter. Keep leaves out of the pond for a better spring.

#### Pond Equipment:

This is a good time to do any pond maintenance on your pond as since the water temperatures are cold; your fish are eating less, creating less waste. So check your equipment to see if any-thing are leaking, cracked hoses, and pumps not working efficiently. Now is the time to do any remodeling while the fish get ready to go into hibernation. Even though the fish are not eating as much, water changes should still be happening but less frequently. Problems are more difficult to fix in colder wetter weather. Check your pond equipment before winter arrives.

#### Leaks and Evaporation:

Be aware should the water level recede. Watch that it doesn't recede to a dangerous level. Water changes and top-offs are perfectly acceptable during the winter months. Use a dechlorinator when doing a small top-offs. Koi Care:

Keep an eye on your koi fish, do not neglect any sores on the koi, even though it is cold does not mean they cannot injure themselves or sores will still happen, especially if anything sharp lands in the pond and they brush up against it.


# **Monthly Club Report to Associated Koi Clubs of America (AKCA)**
