Water Plant of the Month – Innula [Elecampane root]



A genus of about 100 species of flowers and a few shrubs found in temperate zones. Characteristics include: enormous broad dock-like leaves, rough leaf texture, large mounded base of plant, buds open to beautiful yellow, fine-rayed daisies 5 - 6 inches across / 6 foot spreads in late summer. Plant is suitable for planting at the back of a border, or in a wild meadow or prairie-style garden. Grow in full sun.

The Innula is a perennial giving the gardener a lot of value for their dollar because they come back year after year. Inula is an herbal perennial that has value as a medicinal as well as an ornamental presence in the yard. There are several types of Inula plant useful to the landscape and home. Also known as Elecampane root. Can be used in container gardens. Some types of Inula plant are native in North America.

Did you know?

- Koi are bottom feeders by nature and omnivores. Algae and aquatic plants are their diet, too.
- Duckweed is a noxious pest in a pond, not a "treat" for your fish. Azolla and Duckweed can cover pond surface, eliminating oxygen.
- Water Hyacinths start dying because koi are eating their tender trailing root systems. They start to bloom when they become crowded.
