The club plans to participate in two local Koi community events, first, the ZNA show April 1-2, 2023 and, second, the Cupertino Cherry Blossom Festival held April 29-30, 2023. Volunteers are needed.

Winter Water: Each season brings different challenges to Koi keeping and water gardening. Here our climate, it is usually mild and relatively sunny most days. This season we have had more rain





in

than normal and our severe drought is easing. This winter weather also cause our Koi to have extra stress due to being colder than average and wide temperature swings that occur daily (70 degrees in the afternoon, 40 degrees overnights – that's a 30 degree change in one 24 hour time period – image that!)

Our ponds and gardens are happy for the extra H2O, note that rainwater does not cause pH crashes or KH drops. Rain is initially neutral in pH, a perfect 7.0 – but very quickly absorbs low pH contaminants as it falls through the sky. The effect of low pH rain on pH level is usually small, except for heavy rains over a period of days, which can require a need to raise your pH.

Some members have asked about all the extra rainwater and how it may impact our pond's water. Rainwater does not cause pH crashes or KH drops. Rain is initially neutral in pH, a perfect 7.0 – but very quickly absorbs low pH contaminants as it falls through the sky. The effect of low pH rain on pH level is usually small, except for heavy rains over a period of days, which can require a need to raise your pH. When it doubt, test your water.

WHY IS MY KOI LAYING ON ITS SIDE?

Baby its cold outside....our winter season has been a cold one and the Koi have been exposed to the colder temperatures too!

In winter, Koi have a tolerance for cold water to 34°°F for a few days, but are more comfortable at 39°°F. Koi are temperate zone fish not tropical or cold water fish.

Micro Garden - Macro Bloom ;)

Higher power, deeper learning – a micro garden or mini pond project may be just the right size to motivate and inspire one's creative energy. By being with nature, we learn about the natural world around us. So, if you are interested in growing a micro garden or building a mini pond, then here is a little (micro) inspiration while we are over wintering inside this month.



Micro Garden (Mini Oasis)

Ready to assemble or "manufactured", a structure with brackets for containers and a drip irrigation system, an entire "oasis" can be crafted and be fairly self-sufficient on a small scale without breaking the bank. Recycled materials can be utilized in the designs as the designer sees fit. It could be modular or a single unit on a base that could be loaded onto a truck. Various plantings and produce can be grown and used on a small scale by a household with extra to share.

I envision a trend where micro-oasis gardens become trendy. Imagine a small patio that has a water feature and seating for two people.

Micro Pond (Container Water Garden)
