Presidents Corner

Hello members and friends,

2022 is a wrap! Your editor was down over the holiday with a bad cold so we missed the December edition. As you all know we held our annual Holiday Social December 18th. We returned to Hakone Estate and Gardens for our event this holiday season. Thank you Hakone for providing space for our club to gather! We encourage our members to support Hakone by visiting and purchasing annual passes.

The club's community tree was on display between Thanksgiving and New Year's and viewed by thousands of visitors. The weather again was an issue but we were better prepared with our weatherproof decorations. If you haven't had the chance to visit this event downtown San Jose, put it on your list.

We had our election for club officers last month. The board has graciously agreed to serve through the 2023 term. In 2024 we are going to need new leadership. You have been warned. If you would like to become more involved with the club let one of us know. We are going to need additional help this spring with our two big events in April, this would be a great time to spend with the group and see if it's a good match. Now that its winter when we spend more time indoors and less outside with our Koi and ponds we may not notice changes as quickly. One of our sister clubs recommended adding small amounts of baking soda to the ponds after the rains to keep KH or hardness from crashing and lowering pH in the water. This is just a reminder that all of this rain may have diluted the KH in your pond and that could cause a pH crash, many of us don't have a KH test kit to test for KH so it can't hurt to add a cup of baking soda per 1,000 gallons as a precautionary measure. Now is a good time be sure that equipment is running optimally. Feed Koi less as temperatures drop, and have ample aeration in your water. Have a backup plan if the power goes out for and extended time (3 plus days). If power goes out for a short time it should be OK, colder water holds more oxygen.

Hakone Estate and Gardens Holiday Social

A Little Background - Hakone Estate Gardens

This place is an 18-acre traditional Japanese garden in Saratoga, CA. The garden is recognized as one of the oldest Japanese-style residential garden in the Western Hemisphere, and an enduring American treasure.

The tranquility and elegance of the gardens at Hakone beautifully express the Japanese ideal of the garden as a space in which art and nature merge seamlessly. The cultivation of



nature in miniature dates back to the introduction of Buddhism to Japan in 538 AD. Thus began the tradition of transforming a garden into a blissful dwelling place to experience timeless beauty.

Small Bonsai - Mini Garden - Big Smile



Higher power, deeper learning – a small bonsai or mini garden project may be just the right size to motivate and inspire someone's creative energy. By being with nature, we learn about the natural world around us. So, if you ever were interested in growing bonsai,



then a good place to start may be on a mini scale with a bonsai.


Miniature bonsai are called mame bonsai: Bonsai are known for their small size, but the effort to miniaturize trees is sometimes taken to the extreme. The results are tiny little trees (called Mame Bonsai, or Mini Bonsai). Most bonsai trees will live for at least 10 years and some may even survive for 100 years or more! Of course, the lifespan of any bonsai tree is not infinite and there are some things that can shorten the life of these delicate plants. Bonsai that straddle the small-to-miniature category reach about 8 inches (20cm) in height and can take up to 20 years to fully mature. The term "miniature bonsai" generally refers to bonsai small enough to be lifted or moved with one hand.

Bonsai trees have a reputation for being extremely delicate and difficult to maintain. While these specimens do require special attention, once you learn the principles of bonsai care, it's fairly straightforward. *Bonsai is a Japanese word that literally means "planted in a container"*. Bonsai need direct sunlight, from which they make their food. A lack of direct sun will damage them, causing weak foliage and other problems. They like to receive 5-6 hours of sunlight daily, whether inside or outside.

The Ficus bonsai is recommend for beginners that are new to bonsai and do not have the time for regular waterings. Since the Ficus is so resilient to under-watering, it makes it ideal for those that want a low maintenance tree. Pruning the Ficus bonsai is as simple as cutting back leaves. Easy to take care of, the Ficus bonsai needs to be watered thoroughly all over the soil until the water drains through into a tray or saucer. Never let bonsai dry out and avoid keeping it constantly wet. The soil should go from wet to damp between watering.

Golden Corn Koi - New Koi Variety Debuts

Over the years, breeders have been creating new Koi varieties. Here is an example of the newly developed Golden Corn variety of Koi. It has been around for about 5 years and is a hard variety to define because it shows up in so many different variations. Some look like Ginrin or Asagi. One of the strong characteristics is the Koi develop Kanoko (polka dots) pattern as they grow bigger and stronger.
