Did you know?

As the fall season approaches, fallen leaves can quickly make their way to the bottom of the pond. Make sure to use a good pond cover net to prevent this from happening.

The fall is a great time to add aeration to your pond. It serves as additional aeration for the beneficial bacteria for enhanced gas exchange. Switch over to a wheat germ based Koi food to help build up fat reserves on your fish.





Plants and Koi - Making Friends

Plants and Koi can live happy together and help each other thrive in the ponds. The pond keeper needs to want to keep in mind both the needs of the Koi and of the plants. Plants use nitrogen, ammonium, and nitrate. This is the nitrogen cycle that we speak of from time to time as pond keepers. Ammonium converts to nitrite and then to nitrate is referred to as the nitrification or simply the nitrogen cycle.

Koi add lots of ammonia to the pond with their activity. Ammonia comes from their urine and feces. In addition to that, ammonia is also excreted from their gills as they breath (underwater). Plants use ammonia, the first stage of the nitrogen cycle, to grow. Ammonia is fertilizer. Ammonia is toxic to fish. Balance between Koi and plants is goal.

The final stage of nitrogen cycle is nitrates. Nitrates form when the biological filtration begins to break down fish waste. While nitrates are not harmful in low numbers, after time the nitrates can build to toxic levels. It is good to keep nitrates under 60 ppm. Plants and algae use nitrates to grow. Plants can effectively use and remove nitrates in the pond. Plants are used to "balance" the nitrate levels.

Downside to pond plants: Koi disturb plants / messy soil used in potting; parasites – treat plants in a bath of potassium permanganate in large container to prevent issues prior to putting in pond.

Plant of the Month - White Lotus [Nelumbo nucifera]



As a primarily Buddhist country, Japan holds the lotus to be sacred. The lotus is considered one of the Eight Auspicious Symbols, and is a representation of the Buddha. Lotus symbolize the progress of the ultimate mind. It grows from muddy depths through the waters of experience and "blooms in the sunshine of enlightenment."

The petals are in an intriguing arrangement such that one comes after another without an end. In Chinese and Vietnamese, its name means 'flower of endless petals'. Dwarf lotus can be grown as a pot plant. The large bloom, lasting 3 to 6 days, is strikingly beautiful and exotically fragrant.

The seedpod is yellow on a newly-opened lotus, it then turns green and remains for 6 weeks. These dry seedpods are very decorative in flower arrangements. The seeds can survive after hundreds of years. Lotus grow from tubers that are planted in the soil underwater. They can grow to a spread of over 10 feet, depending on the variety. Lotus can be white, pink, red or blue. Outdoor, it's hardy to zone 4 (as long as the tuber is kept from freezing).



Do-It-Yourself Backyard Aquaponics Systems

Backyard aquaponics as a hobby is emerging as more people wish to experiment with it...

Aquaponics is a hybrid food growing technology that combines aquaculture (growing fish) and hydroponics (growing veggies in non-soil media and nutrient-laden water).

This is an example of a simple, top tank growing what looks like strawberries with koi fish in the bottom tank. This set up is compact and looks energy efficient with a decent amount of room for both fish and plants. Notice the clay like media that the plants are growing in.
