Many of us have been enjoying our gardens and ponds more now that its spring. A little planning and attention insures a happy, healthy pond later in the hotter part of the season. Keep your pond and filters clean during this period to avoid bacterial infections on your Koi. Reports of algae blooms (string type), pH issues, and predator activity have been noted. Check filters, deep clean to remove debris accumulated over time in the system. Check and tune equipment. Pick up fresh Koi food and other supplies as needed... have dechlorinator and a test kit on hand for water changes and monitoring.

Another topic, if you would like to show off your pond, we are looking for one more summertime pond social location. Timeframe is late summer / September.

Some things to remember about Koi keeping...

- Koi take patience you can't rush their growth
- Pond depth is valuable to help control temperature
- Examine your fish frequently to insure they are free from abrasions, diseased scales, or parasites treat regularly for parasites all ponds have parasites sooner or later
- Pumps must be run 24 hours a day to insure good health and growth of the fish
- Some fish turn out great and some do not. There is no substitute for good blood lines.
- Test your water supply for salt content before you add any salt to the pond water
- Check with other club members when you have questions
